<u>Course Overview</u>: In Spanish 2-3 a strong emphasis is given to speaking, listening, reading and writing the language, as well as to studying culture. First semester students will continue to attain proficiency in communicating about present tense events while beginning their mastery of recounting activities that have occurred in the past. Second semester, students will be given ample opportunities to put the knowledge gained in Spanish 1 and 2 into practice through structured classroom activities, projects, and assignments. In addition, students will attain a higher level of proficiency through the acquisition of new complex grammatical constructions, and the introduction of the future and conditional verb tenses

Instructional Philosophy:

Many instructional approaches will be used to help all types of learners: Teaching Proficiency through Reading and Storytelling (TPRS), questioning strategies (yes/no, either/on, multiple choice, short answer), Total Physical Response (TPR), reading authentic documents, listening to authentic music, visiting authentic websites and studying authentic films to name a few. Students will be actively engaged and will be expected to participate voluntarily and/or when called upon. Participation does not mean always giving the correct answer but a willingness to try to use Spanish and a genuine attempt at learning the material or asking questions when the material is unclear. The class will be conducted in Spanish and students are expected to communicate in Spanish as well.

Course Goals:

Students will also be keeping a journal in Spanish. Writing topics and reading class time will be given to students as the teacher sees fit. Topics will be related to the material being studied in class. A new component of Spanish 2/3 is that students will be required to bring in and discuss a current event every other week on the second semester. The current event must be from a Spanish language source and will be discussed in Spanish. Current events are due on Fridays.

Spanish 2/3 will also introduce students to Hispanic Film. One major film will be viewed per quarter.

Specific objectives: (please refer to the pacing guide for specific grammar, and vocabulary)

- 1. To develop the 2/3 language skills: Listening, speaking, reading and writing; to at least an ACTFL novice intermediate/high level.
- 2. To participate in conversations in Spanish, with good pronunciation, in order to share feelings, emotions, opinions and information.
- 3. To comprehend oral and written communication on a variety of topics.
- 4. To present information, concepts, and ideas to an audience in Spanish.
- 5. To explore the relationships among the practices, products, and perspectives of the diverse Hispanic cultures.
- 6. To connect knowledge of Spanish with other disciplines.
- 7. To recognize the distinctive viewpoints of other cultures.
- 8. To compare the nature of the Spanish language to English.
- 9. To contrast Hispanic cultures with individual ethnic background.
- 10. To employ the Spanish language both within and beyond the school setting.
- 11. To develop an interest in continuing the study of the Spanish language for personal enrichment.

Note: Course timeline and topics are subject to change.

Student Responsibilities:

- Always do your best.
- Make the most of class time!

- Come to class on time and prepared with all of the appropriate materials.
- THE RULE IS RESPECT AND RESPECT IS THE RULE!! Make-up Work:
- It is the **student's responsibility** to find out about missed work before or after class time. If a reasonable time has passed and the student has not made up the work, he/she may forfeit credit for that assignment.
- Any work not made up prior to the last week of the grading period will be severely penalized.
- Exceptions will be made due to extraordinary circumstances at the discretion of the teacher on a case-by-case basis.

Retake Policy: Most grammar & vocabulary QUIZZES may be retaken ones for a better grade, before we start with next unit

- O In order to retake a quiz, student must present physical evidence of study (notecards, parent note, conjuguemos, this is language, duolingo or other online resources printed out with evidence of completion, textbook/workbook practice, etc.)
- o In order to retake any quiz, a CHAT appointment must be made for additional tutoring prior to the retake.
- O The retake must occur **BEFORE** the test that covers the same material. Once the test has been taken, all prior quizzes may not be retaken.
- O The retake policy is subject to revocation if abuse of the privilege is detected.

<u>Homework Policy:</u> In order to receive full credit for homework, it is due at the beginning of the class period in the following format outlined below. Assignments that do not meet this criteria will be penalized:

- On a whole sheet of loose-leaf notebook paper (unless otherwise stated)
- O Handwriting must be neat and legible
- O Student work shows considerable effort
- O The student's name, date, and title of the assignment are in the upper right corner

<u>Grades</u>: different activities, homework, quizzes, projects, tests, etc. will be oriented towards listening, reading, writing and speaking with the following percentages:

- 5. 15% <u>Interpersonal skills and participation:</u> This includes paying attention and contributing to the class. Reacting to class

discussions in real time is what this is all about—back and forth communication with other speakers. This is the first category because face-to-face verbal interaction is what learning a language is mostly about—the vast majority of students take a language because they want to be able to SPEAK it and this is how that is done—back and forth communication.

Final test can also be a final performance task (20% of second semester)

<u>Course Credit</u>: Any student must receive a B or better in the Spanish 4 coursework in order to be recommended to proceed on to the next course in the sequence. Although a student may still receive course credit for a C or a D, failure to maintain a C+ average or higher indicates failure to attain sufficient proficiency in the language to guarantee success at the next level.

<u>CHAT (Collaboration-Help-Achievement-Tutoring)</u>: CHAT is every WEDNESDAY and THURSDAY from 11:54 a.m. to 12:52 p.m. This is an opportunity for students to have time to eat lunch and seek assistance from teachers with school work. On pre-determined days each month CHAT time may be used to meet with clubs. Teachers may require a student to make up work during CHAT time. If a student has received a pass from a teacher to attend their CHAT, it is MANDATORY that the student attend. Failure to attend a CHAT appointment will result in disciplinary action.
